The Tea Room will be alive with music all day long, including Connemara Patch (uilleann pipes, fiddle, bouzouki), ensembles from Center for Irish Music, Hannah Flowers, Harpist (vocals and harp), the Giggin' Siles (songs in Irish and English) and Lake Effect (flute, fiddle, guitar).

Food for your mind with three seminars:

Chad McAnally presents *The Teenager Who Saved Irish music: the work of Edward Bunting* – the story of the 17-year-old collector and musician Edward Bunting (1770-1840) who saved centuries of Irish traditional music from oblivion. **Jane Kennedy** presents *The 50th Anniversary of Minnesota's Children's Program of Northern Ireland*– the story of the program that removed youngsters for part of the summer from the tense environment created by battling Protestants and Catholics. This gave the children an opportunity to see Protestants and Catholics living peacefully in the Midwest.

Dave and Suzanne Rhees of Bundle & Go present *Paddy's Trip to Rio: Exploring Irish/Brazilian Musical Connections* - the story of their exploration of Brazilian music from the point of view of Irish traditional musicians. They will compare and contrast the two music styles and discuss how they are blended into their St. Patrick's Day performance.

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The Gaelic Corner- By Will Kenny

Gaeltacht

I grew up in Pennsylvania, a place where we certainly had four full seasons. But the weather was, of course, not as extreme as it is in Minnesota.

And one of the first things to learn coming into this state is that wind matters. At its mildest, a

change in the weather, perhaps a front moving in. At its most extreme, the summer brings tornadic and downburst winds that can blow your house away.

And then there's wind in the winter. Every Minnesotan knows about *gaothfhuarú*, or "wind-colding," that is, "wind chill." And on those windy winter days the chill can even reach us inside if we have a *doras gaoithe*, a "windy door," that lets in a draft.

Gaoth is the Irish word for "wind" and it is widely pronounced "GWEE." Indeed, the name of the northern Donegal town of Gaoth Dobhair, a strong Gaeltacht area, is rendered as Gweedore in English. (But this gaoth means "estuary" and Dobhair refers to a nearby river.)

As in English, winds are described by the direction they are coming from. A "west wind," *gaoth aniar*; blows from west to east. But a "northwest wind" is a *gaoth aniar aduaidh*. That translates as a "westnorth wind" rather than "northwest". In Irish, when we name those points on the corners of the compass, the east-west direction comes first.

I don't know if northwest (or westnorth) winds are rare in Ireland, but "northwest" figures in an interesting and common idiom in Irish. When we say something "comes out of the northwest," *Tháinig sé aniar aduaidh*, we mean it came "out of the blue," it was a total surprise. For example, when Nicola Sturgeon announced that she was stepping down as First Minister of Scotland last month, it took everyone by surprise and this *aniar aduaidh* expression showed up quite a bit in the Irish language media.

Many wind-related expressions are very similar in English and Irish. In Irish we can "take the wind out of someone's sails," *an ghaoth a bhaint as seolta duine,* just as in English. And we can "go like the wind" in English, which is translated quite literally in the Irish expression *imeacht ar nós na gaoithe,* more or less "going with the style of the wind."

You might be a bit uncomfortable (or so might the person sitting next to you) if you have *gaoth i ngoile*, "wind in your stomach,"

or "flatulence." That can lead to *gaoth a bhriseadh*, quite literally "breaking wind."

As you might expect, there are also wind idioms that don't have English equivalents. For instance, to be *ar bharr na gaoithe,* "on top of the wind," is to be frivolous or flighty,

perhaps too fond of enjoyment. *Imeacht le gaoth*, "to go with the wind," has different meanings depending on the context. Applied to a person, it suggests a drifter, someone who wanders aimlessly. Applied to words of advice, it suggests the advice went unheeded. And in reference to money, it indicates that money was squandered.

And using a different verb to express "go" in "go with the wind," *dul le gaoth*, can mean "to go stark, raving mad."

As you know, not all wind is created by Mother Nature. Some individuals produce quite a bit of wind once they get talking. These people are known as *lucht gaoithe móire*, the "big wind crowd," or in English: "windbags"! Arguing with such people can be like *gairm in aghaidh gaoithe*, "a call against the wind," which is a "waste of breath." When dealing with these people, you may find that "Their promises are merely wind," *níl ina chuid gealltanas ach gaoth mhór*.

A perceptive person doesn't need to be hit over the head to get the point. We say, *Ni raibh uaithi ach gaoth an fhocail*, "She only needed wind of the word," that is, "She only needed the slightest hint" to get what we were saying.

Speaking of perceptive, you might encounter a "windbag" at the pub who is boastful or argumentative. And you may realize what's behind his behavior when you notice that *Níl é boladh na gaoithe atá uaidh*. This means "It is not the smell of the wind that I get from him," suggesting that the scent of alcohol is strong.

While we at Gaeltacht Minnesota understand that *Téann focal le gaoth*, "words are just wind," we find words fascinating, especially Irish ones. Visit us at www.gaelminn.org.

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On Leabhragan (The Bookcase)

The Library at the Edge of the World—Felicity Hayes-McCoy — Harper Perennial 2016



Hanna Casey, smarting from a failed marriage and the loss of her privileged life in London, moves back to her hometown on the West coast of Ireland with her sulky teenage daughter, no job, and what she hopes is only a temporary billet in her interfering, bossy mum's house. Feeling a bit like a rebellious teenager herself, Hanna finds a job as librarian in the Lissbeg Library on the peninsula of Finfarran (a fictitious place greatly resembling the Dingle Peninsula, where the author lives.) Prickly in temperament but motivated to make a new life, Hanna is determined to breathe new energy into the library, expanding it from a moribund book depository into a community center and beating heart of Lissbeg. She also begins restoring a ramshackle cottage left to her by her great aunt and soon finds the builder, Fury O'Shea, has his own ideas about how to renovate the old pile. Her battles with her mother, her daughter, and builder Fury are soon augmented by a new problem: the county council has a plan to consolidate the library system. "Consolidate", as in close the Lissbeg Library Hanna has fought so hard to resuscitate. But all is not lost: aided by a canny old nun, Fury, the local mum's group, and the farmers and shopkeepers in the area, Hanna takes on the town council and local planning board to try and save the community's only library within miles. Does the unlikely band of crusaders succeed? Does Hanna ever get to move into her cottage and escape her pushy mum and make a new life for herself? You'll have to read this book, the first in the Finfarran series of six, to see how our plucky heroine fares. After that, read the next one in the series, and the next....bet you can't read just one! If you love books, the west of Ireland, quirky characters and a determined heroine, this one's for you. I found myself laughing at the dialogue and Kerry ways, it rang so true.




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Northwoods Songs: Irish Songs from Lumberjacks and Great Lakes Sailors By Brian Miller

Farewell to Nancy

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We return to the wonderful repertoire of New Brunswick/Maine singer Carrie Grover this month for a song you can hear online via the Carrie Grover Project website. Grover's singing is full of character and nuance and is definitely worth hearing. As I say above, the recording does a far better job of conveying her style than anything I can transcribe (or describe!) here.

Grover's "Farewell to Nancy" contains some "floating" lines in the first verse that turn up in versions of other songs including "Green Grows the Laurel" and the Scottish Bothy ballad "Airlin's Fine Braes." Steve Roud classifies "Farewell to Nancy" along with a song called "Pretty Susie" that was sung in parts of the southern US. A version of "Pretty Susie" collected by Max Hunter in Arkansas (see the online Max Hunter collection) does share many words with Grover's song.

It is Carrie Grover's striking melody that I find most attractive here. I love the big leaps and interesting pitch variances in her performance.

Northwoods Songs features a new song each month pulled from my research into old songs collected in the pine woods region that stretches from New Brunswick west through northern Minnesota. In the 1800s, a vibrant culture of singing and songmaking developed in lumber camp bunkhouses and on Great Lakes ships. The repertoire and singing style were greatly influenced by Irish folk repertoire and singing styles. Many singers in the region had Irish background themselves.

Each installment of Northwoods Songs is also published online at www.evergreentrad.com. My hope is that others will learn some of these songs and make them their own as I have. -Brian Miller

(*Irish for 'Bits and Pieces') by Copper Shannon

Slán go fóill – bye for now to our good friend **Mark Dietzsch**. Mark is returning to his native Australia in March, after 29 years here in Minnesota. 


