Irish Dancer Sets, Meets His Goals

Dancer Zachariah Vandermuese-Siteki, 17, of Minneapolis has been dancing for 10 years; he received his Decade of Dance Award this past March. Zach first became interested in Irish dance while attending Irish Fair as a youngster. He tells us he was "mesmerized by the intricate steps and leaps of the dancers" and anxious to find a place where he could learn "those tangled steps!"

Devoting time to Irish dance is challenging for this busy teen, who is also active in Anoka County 4-H

and the Fort Snelling Society of the Children of the American Revolution, as well as devoting time to school and school related activities. Zach has been able to share his love of Irish dance in workshops hosted by both these groups, as well as showcasing his talent at the Minnesota State Fair through 4-H.

Zach has been working very hard and with great persistence to reach an important goal – Open Championship (OC) level, allowing him to compete nationally. His recommender praises Zach's progress, noting that he is a "hard working dancer" – who is also kind and devoted to both his dance community and his larger community.

Zach will be using his Educational Grant for travel and registration expenses for the North American Irish Dance National Competition in Grapevine, TX over the Fourth of July. Zach is looking forward to "seeing firsthand the competitors in [his] division." The opportunity to compete at the national level will allow him "to observe other student dance styles" as well as set goals for his own continued growth.

The Gaelic Corner- By Will Kenny

Here we are already, in the midst of a hot, sunny July! When I was a lad, which is admittedly a very long time ago, nobody had heard of the term "sunscreen." All we knew was that having a deep tan was considered very attractive, and that the way to get that tan was to soak up as much sun as possible



At the beach there were always plenty of people lying bolg le gréin, or "belly to the sun."

Instead of a "sun shield," sciath ghréine, people would cover themselves in various "sun lotions" (lóis ghréine) that, it turned out, were doing nothing to block the all important radaíocht ultraivialait ("UV radiation") that cooks your skin and sets you up for potentially serious medical issues decades later. I even knew people who coated themselves in baby oil and then stretched out on the beach under the bright sun.

The object of this exercise (besides making a ton of money for manufacturers off sun lotions and sunscreen) was to change the color of your skin, to achieve that blissful and attractive state known as "tan." If pressed to name a color for tan skin, the Irish might label it as *buí*. Now, most students learn early in their studies that *buí* is "yellow," as in a dandelion. But when we're talking about "yellow skin" we really aren't visualizing a person who glows bright yellow. Rather, someone who is *buí* might have a somewhat darker, even swarthy complexion. Or, in the case of "jaundice," which even in English we describe as yellow skin, the Irish have a separate word based on *buí*, namely, *buíochán*.

In general, the Irish simply avoid assigning a color name to tanned, or even sunburned, skin. For that lovely tan, we say that *dath na gréine*, "the color of the sun," is on you -- not meaning yellow (*buî*) like the sun, literally, but colored by the effects of the sun. If you fell asleep while you were lying out there under the noonday sun, you probably ended up with *griandó*, literally "sunburn," on you, a nice, painful red – that again we don't assign a color name in Irish.

Indeed, to be *i do chraiceann dearg*, "in your red skin," is not to be sun-burned, but rather to be stark naked. We also have the odd expression, *Dá gcuirfeá an taobh dearg de do chraiceann amach*, "if you were to put the red side of your skin out," that is, turn your skin inside out, to express, "No matter how much you rant and rave . . ."

You can easily find yourself as do chraiceann, "out of your skin," with either anger or joy, and it just means that you are "beside yourself." And there are thinskinned and thick-skinned Irish people, of course, but neither expression uses this word craiceann (which implies human

skin). "Thin-skinned" is usually translated by a separate word, *goilliúnach*, meaning "sensitive" or "touchy." And for thick-skinned, we use a word for an animal skin, *seithe*, and not only that, but a "tough animal skin," *seithe righin*, to boot.

Craiceann is used for things similar to skin, like craiceann cáise for the "rind" of a cheese, or craiceann úill for an "apple peel." Craiceann is used in many phrases to express something like "surface," for example, Tá craiceann ar an bhfarraige, "there's a skin on the sea," meaning that it is smooth, or calm.

And it's only a small step from there to saying, *tá craiceann na fírinne air*, "there's the skin of truth on it," meaning, "it has the ring of truth."

One thing you definitely want to have a skin on is the stories you tell. A scéal gan chraiceann, a "story without skin," is an implausible one, and a leithscéal gan chraiceann, an "excuse without skin," is indeed a flimsy one.

Of course, after you spend a while being parboiled by the heat and humidity that graces our state in the summer, you may find it quite a shock to step into an over air-conditioned office or shop. When that cold air first hits you, don't be surprised if you display some *craiceann circe*, the "skin of a hen" . . . or "goose pimples."

Gaeltacht Minnesota wishes you a bright summer ... but don't forget the *sciath ghréine!*

Ní hé an bhreáthact a chuireann an corcán ag fiuchadh. Literally, "It is not beauty that sets the pot to boiling," that is, "Beauty is only skin deep."



Terry "Cuz" Teahan's



On Leabhragan (The Bookcase)

The Alternatives — Caoilinn Hughes — Riverhead Books 2024



The four Flattery sisters, Olwen, Maeve, Rhona and Nell, grew up fast when their parents died under tragic circumstances. Now in their thirties, single, all possessing PhDs, each of them are in search of an authentic life and meaningful work in their specialized fields. One day the eldest, Olwen, walks away from her life as professor of geology, unsure whether the classic academic exercise of study/teach/publish matters anymore in the face of cataclysmic climate change. Her efforts to go off the grid and become a recluse prompt the other three sisters, chef Maeve, political scientist Rhona, and philosophy professor Nell to promptly put their careers on hold and hare off in search of their big sister. If Olwen doesn't want to be found, why are they looking for her? Is she in trouble, or just needing some quiet so she can think in peace for a change? Olwen isn't sure whether to receive her sisters' visit as a gift or an unwelcome intrusion.

The questions are there, and perhaps a few answers, in this wryly funny and subtly heart-breaking book. The ties among sisters, the unsettled childhood scores, the truth of their mother's death (accident or suicide?); a few revelations float up, the chief one being Life is Complicated.

The author has captured the secret language and rhythms of sisters and the exclusive references they share (as one of three sisters, I can vouch for Hughes' veracity in this). Who hasn't reached their thirties wondering if their hard-fought for, expensive education is worth much in the face of climate crash, political schisms, food shortages, and other global challenges? Each highly educated sister is grasping for meaning in her professional and personal life, where the rules and norms are shifting underfoot (literally, in geologist Olwen's case). *The Alternatives* is brilliant, funny, and timely, a deeply humane look at how we ask questions and the answers we find, in our families and the wider world.

We have another song this month from the pen of James J. Somers who came to Duluth at age 17 from the Georgian Bay region of Ontario. He was in Duluth in November 1883 when the packet steamer Manistee left Duluth harbor for Ontonagon, Michigan never to return. Tragedy struck again that December when the schooner Mary Ann Hulbert, also out of Duluth, sank near St. Ignace Island at the northern end of Lake Superior.

As with most other songs in Somers' book, he left us no melody for this one. Andy Irvine's version of Pat Reilly came into my head when I was looking at Somers' text so I have tried to adapt it to that melody here. I made a few edits to Somers' words.

The original, along with the rest of his book "Jim's Western Gems" is available in digital form via archive.org.

Northwoods Songs features a new song each month pulled from my research into old songs collected in the pine woods region that stretches from New Brunswick west through northern Minnesota. In the 1800s, a vibrant culture of singing and song-making developed in lumber camp bunkhouses and on Great Lakes ships. The repertoire and singing style were greatly influenced by Irish folk repertoire and singing styles. Many singers in the region had Irish background themselves.



Both venues will open for those who want to order dinner at 6:00 and the show will start at 7:30. Drinks will be served throughout the evening. Tickets are \$20.




