#### IAM Honors Sherry Ladig

Saturday, November 22, 2024 - Celtic Junction Arts Center

IAM Honors is a very special evening – a chance to celebrate the keepers of our traditions and to recognize the very special people who "keep the fires burning." They help ensure that Irish music and dance continue to thrive in our community. The 2024 IAM Honors recipient, musician and composer Sherry Ladig, is recognized for her contributions to Irish traditional music in the Twin Cities and beyond.

Irish Arts Minnesota will celebrate Sherry at a special event on Friday, Nov. 22 at the Celtic Junction Arts Center. The evening will include time for socializing as well as plenty of fine traditional music. Also featured will be performance by some IAM Educational Grant recipients.

Sherry has been writing and making music all her life as a pianist, arranger, composer and music historian. While she has played a wide range of music, including ragtime piano, she is best known here in the Twin Cities as arranger and pianist of Celtic music and as a composer of traditional-style tunes. Her bands include Dunquin (traditional Irish), Dalwinnie (Scottish) and the New Pearl Buttons (mid-to-late-19<sup>th</sup> century American). Sherry also plays for dancing with the Twin Cities Ceili Band.

Dunquin has been a mainstay at IAM's St. Patrick's Day Irish Celebration for many years, performing "traditional Irish exuberant reels and jigs and heart-melting Irish airs" on piano (Sherry), flutes & whistles (Don Ladig) and fiddle (Rosa Wells) in the Tea Room and expanding our understanding of the music through a series of fascinating seminars. And you will always find Dunquin at Irish Fair.

Sherry and her bands entertain audiences in a wide range of venues, bringing their beautiful music to intimate house concerts, historic homes, parish halls, outdoor settings and more.

Sherry has played a special role in helping to strengthen our Twin Cities Traditional music community as a composer of tunes. Sherry has written a wide range of tunes to honor special people in our community, including writing tunes for many a previous IAM Honoree. According to Sherry "There are no boundaries in music, and cross-fertilization invigorates new music."

Sherry is also a long-time contributor to the IMDA/IAM newsletter, writing book reviews with an Irish connection for *An Leabhragan* (The Bookcase) monthly for at least 15 years.

The evening will include performances by special friends contributing their talents. The doors will open at 6:30 pm, with the program beginning at 7:00 pm. #### Young Musician is Ready for Her Next Step

Musician Ellie Schirmer of Inver Grove Heights first became engaged with Irish traditional music as a dancer, studying with O'Shea Irish Dance. (Ellie received her IAM Decade of Dance this past March.) While she comes from a family who loves Irish traditional music, Ellie tells us "It was from dancing with live musicians at the Celtic Junction, and seeing other dancers also play instruments that I first got interested in playing an instrument myself."

Beginning with tin whistle, she was encouraged to take up the flute by her teacher at the Center for Irish Music (CIM). Her recommender tells us that Ellie has shown both "dedication and persistence with her music." She is also a devoted member of the community, taking up drums to compete with CIM's under 15 ceili band "demonstrating her personal drive to expand her musical skills and [her] community-minded spirit." Ellie plays with CIM's Starling youth ensemble and in Grupa Cheoil. Competing last year in the Midwest Fleadh in tin whistle and for the first time also in flute, Ellie received a 1st in the whistle and 2nd place in flute, qualifying her for Fleadh Cheoil na hÉireann, where she competed in both the flute and the whistle.

With the help of the rental program at the Center for Irish Music, Ellie has been playing a keyless flute. She is now ready for her own keyed wooden flute. Ellie is using her IAM Educational Grant for help with the purchase of a new, hand made 6-keyed wooden flute made in Ireland. Her recommender feels that a keyed wooden flute will "set Ellie up for further development as a skilled traditional Irish musician and encourage her artistic journey."



Ellie is very involved in the community, performing with O'Shea Irish Dance in their holiday shows as both a dancer and featured youth musician and volunteering her help with various events with the Center for Irish Music, the Celtic Junction Arts Center and the Irish Dance Parent Association.

Irish Arts Minnesota is delighted to help this dedicated young musician continue to grow and expand her joy of the music.



## Irish Arts MN invites collaboration between Irish and non-Irish groups for St. Patrick's Day 2025

Since 2019, Irish Arts MN has included a cross-cultural component for St. Patrick's Day programming.

Immigration and diversity are topics that have received an increasing amount of attention in recent years, not all of which has been positive. From the mid-19th century to the early 20th century, Irish immigrants frequently encountered prejudice and discrimination as they attempted to adapt to American culture and society. Now, all too often, their descendants see other races and ethnicities being treated in a similar manner.

Irish Arts MN (IAM) believes that exposure to the music, dance, and customs of groups other than one's own can help bridge gaps, foster understanding, and promote mutual respect. To that end, the IAM is hereby *challenging* Irish and non-Irish organizations alike to seek out and collaborate with one another in order to create a "performance piece" to be presented on the Main Stage at the Landmark Center on March 16 and/or March 17.

Previous presentations include: a collaboration between Irish musicians and African drumming (CUMAR), a collaboration between Irish dancers and Bollywood-style dancers, a melding of Irish and Brazilian music (Paddy goes to Rio), and a comparison of Irish dance and clogging.

- Proposals must involve an Irish and a non-Irish collaborator (individual or group)

- Performances must be 15 to 30 minutes in length
- Performances will be scheduled at IAM's St. Patrick's Day Irish Celebration or Day of Irish Dance at Landmark Center
- Up to a \$3,000 honorarium is provided

### Irish Dance is an International Passion! By Jan Casey

There's a new Irish dance school in the Twin Cities. Irish Steps Dance School is led by Irina Orf, ADCRG. Irina, who hails from Kyiv in Ukraine, followed the same path to her love of Irish dance as many others – she saw Michael Flatley in The Lord of the Dance in Ukraine. She knew after that exciting performance that she wanted to learn to do that – she was hooked!

Irina studied Irish dance as an adult in Ukraine and competed extensively, earning World and European team championships. She trained through the auspices of the World Irish Dance



Association (WIDA), earning her ADCRG accreditation. The World Irish Dance Association includes affiliates from 20 countries around the world. WIDA is an Open Platform organization – competitions are open to anyone regardless of affiliation with a dance school. It's interesting to note that, before the war, there were 15 Irish dance schools in Ukraine, with 5 schools located in Kyiv.

Irina's experience with Irish dance varied from how things are usually done here in the U.S. Studying Irish dance in Ukraine was open ended, with dancers coming to class as they were able. There were no "semesters" or sessions – study continued without breaks.

Irina came to the United States 5 years ago and made her home in White Bear Lake with her husband. She began teaching Irish dance 2 years ago to children and adults through a school in White Bear Lake. Her classes include about 25 children and a small group of adults, performing for the community

a small group of adults, performing for the community a couple of times a year. Her dancers have also been competing in feiseanna (Irish dance competitions) on-line.

Beginning this Fall, Irish Steps Dance School is offering classes in St. Paul in their new studio at 1 Water Street W, just down the road from Harriet Island. New to the Twin Cities and the Twin Cities Irish Dance community, Irina didn't realize what was going on with all the traffic when she visited her new studio the third week in August!

A warm welcome to this new member of our Irish dance community.

#### The Gaelic Corner- By Will Kenny

Gaeltacht

It's that time again, all the signs are there. It's the time when it seems that every time the phone rings, it is an uathghlao – an "automatic call" or "robocall" – from one political party (páirtí polaitíochta) or the other. It's the time when you are wearing out an

cnaipe tosta ("the mute button") on your TV remote so you don't have to listen to the same fógraí feachtais ("campaign ads") again and again. It's the time when you actually get a lot of mail in your mailbox, most of it duilleoigíní ("flyers" or "leaflets," from the word duilleog, "a leaf") encouraging you to support one candidate or another.


In other words, it is the run-up to our next election.

"Election" is toghchán in Irish. The verb togh means "to select" or "to choose." The selection is made, of course, by "voting," which is represented in Irish by a word of English origins, namely vótáil. The letter "v" appears only in loan-words in Irish and is not part of the standard Irish alphabet. And that "v" is often pronounced as a "w" sound, so it would be common to hear something like "Whoa-tawl" for this word vótáil.

The top prize this year is the White House, "top" being something of a cross-language pun in this sentence. The Irish word for "president" -- of the country, of a club, of any organization -- is *uachtarán*. Now, *uachtar* means the "top" or "upper part" of something. This has straightforward uses such as *uachtar bus*, the "top deck of a bus." Or we might say that someone has *an lámh in uachtar ar dhuine*, that is, they have the "upper hand," the advantage, on someone. So the *Uachtarán* is at the top of the hierarchy.

Of course, cream rises to the top of milk, so *uachtar* is also used to mean "cream." And if you make that cream "frozen," you get *uachtar reoite* or "ice cream." Unlike English, then, in Irish the terms for "president" and "ice cream" are based on the same word.

Each major party, the "Democrats" (na Daonlathaithe) and the "Republicans" (na Poblachtaigh), has its own



Of course, your Minnesota "ballot" (ballóid) will offer you way more than just two Presidential tickets. There are usually *iarrthóirí* from the *Páirtí Liobraíoc* ("Libertarian Party") and *Na Glasaigh* ("The Greens"). This year Minnesota will give you five other possible Presidents to vote for, plus a write-in slot.

And a complete ticket includes a candidate for "Vice-President," or *LeasUachtarán*. *Leas* is a prefix that kind of indicates a substitute or backup item. In addition to "Vice-President," the prefix *leas* is used to express concepts like "stepsister" (*leasdeirfiúr*) -- evil or not -- and "nickname" (*leasainm*).

Add in the candidates for your *Seanadóir* ("Senator") and your *Ionadaí* ("Representative") and for state and local offices and that's a lot of *polaiteoirí* ("politicians") bombarding you with pitches. And besides the stuff the parties send out, in this election season there seems to be more attention than usual on *moladh na ndaoine cáiliúla* -- the "praise of famous people," that is, celebrity endorsements. Of course, these pitches are nothing but the *fírinne* ("truth"). Who ever heard of a politician who was a *bréagadóir* ("liar")?

The feachtas Uachtaránach, the "Presidential campaign," seems to last forever in this country, and the ruthless repetition of all those nasty and ridiculous political ads might have you shouting *Tá mé bréan de* at your TV. *Bréan* is an adjective meaning "foul" or "putrid." So, *Tá mé bréan de* is a colorful way of saying, "I've had it!" or "I'm fed up!"



On Leabhragan (The Bookcase)

Trust Her — Flynn Berry — Viking/Random House 2024



Although this book reads well as a stand-alone thriller, I wish I had known in advance that it is actually a sequel to Barry's bestseller, *Northern Spy.* Many other readers suggest reading that novel first to establish the characters and plotlines of two Belfast sisters, Tessa and Marian Daley, up to their necks in IRA intrigue. One might think this is a historical novel, but the author states the events are "set in the near future", so one presumes the peace agreement hasn't held, and that warfare has resumed in Northern Ireland.

The book begins three years after Tessa and Marian have escaped from the IRA; they are presumed to have been killed in a raid. Resettled in Dublin with new identities and jobs, they are also mothers. Tessa has a four-year-old son, Finn, and shares custody with his dad; Marian has a six-month-old daughter Saoirse and is married to a film documentarian. The two live ordinary lives in the same modest neighborhood, grateful the political drama is over. But somehow the IRA discovers that they are alive. They kidnap Tessa, threatening to kill her family if she doesn't meet with her old MI5 handler and convince him to turn and become an IRA informant. This part of the

plot strained credulity; how, exactly, is Tessa meant to do this? Sleep with him, then persuade him his secure job is worth betraying for a violent, uncertain future? Moving on...

Tessa is no longer a young woman with only herself to consider, and neither is Marian, who always was the sister more active in IRA activities. So the sisters devise a way of working the two sides off each other. Their plan leads to a thrilling, suspenseful unraveling, replete with disappearances, a menacing police detective intent on discovering an IRA sleeper cell, and plenty of misdirection. Will the sins of the fathers—and mothers—be visited upon the next generation? There's a plot twist or two as Tessa and Marian carry out their scheme, aware that one slip could destroy their family and their newfound lives. Blood ties are thicker than political affinities, and desperation is a strong motive for risky moves.

By all means, *Trust Her* is worth a read, but perhaps you should start with *Northern Spy* first to establish the whole plotline. I'm going right out tomorrow to check that one out of the library, to catch the origin story of the fierce and compelling Daley sisters.

## Northwoods Songs: Irish Songs from Lumberjacks and Great Lakes Sailors By Brian Miller



It was in the month of August in eighteen forty-four, My parents they transported me far from my native shore, Because I would not break the vow I swore unto my dear-o, They forced me from the arms of my darling Nellie Greer.

To leave my home and Ireland where my first breath I drew, They sent me to America my fortune to pursue, For three weeks on the ocean no danger did I fear-o, For my heart was with the girl I left, my darling Nellie Greer.

The raging seas rolled mountains high, which tossed us to and fro,

Our ship she struck upon a rock and to pieces she did go, Of three hundred fifty passengers, but thirteen reached the shore-o.

The others to the bottom went, we never saw them more.

We lay on St. Paul's Island, for four long days, or five, Our bed it was the cold, cold ground our covering was the skies, Our money and our clothing gone from off that doleful wreck-o, Now weren't we a dreadful sight when we landed in Quebec?

I'd rather have my Nellie than riches, land or fame, For riches are so fleeting and fame is but a name, Though many miles divide us true love can never die-o, I seem to hear her voice as I hear the night wind sigh.

I chose another song this month that depicts an Ireland to Canada immigration story. Unlike last month's song, "Carnanbane," "Nellie Greer" (Roud 4084) appears exclusively in North American collections so it could be that it was composed on this side of the Atlantic.

The destination here is Quebec (presumably Quebec City) which was the other main Canadian port of entry for Irish immigrants along with St. John, New Brunswick. St. Paul Island is a remote and extremely rugged island 15 miles northeast of Cape Breton, Nova Scotia. Edwin Guillet in *The Great Migration* wrote that St. Paul Island "has been the site of numerous shipwrecks; many vessels, carried out of their reckoning by the currents, having been dashed against it when concealed by fog, and instantly shattered to atoms. Human bones and other memorials of these disasters are strewed around its base."

The above text is my own composite drawing on versions from Carrie Grover (Nova Scotia/Maine), Lena Bourne Fish (New York/New Hampshire), Mary Ann Galpin (Newfoundland) and Martin McManus (Ontario). There are other versions collected by Helen Hartness Flanders in New England. Most singers had the woman's name as "Sally Greer" but Grover sang Nellie. The melody above is a very slightly tweaked take on that used by Carrie Grover and for it I am indebted to the wonderful Carrie Grover Project website created by Julie Mainstone Savas at carriegroverproject.com. You can see Grover's full version there.

Northwoods Songs features a new song each month pulled from my research into old songs collected in the pine woods region that stretches from New Brunswick west through northern Minnesota. In the 1800s, a vibrant culture of singing and song-making developed in lumber camp bunkhouses and on Great Lakes ships. The repertoire and singing style were greatly influenced by Irish folk repertoire and singing styles. Many singers in the region had Irish background themselves.


